

The Emily City Council met for a regular meeting on Tuesday, May 14, 2024 in the Council Chambers and was called to order by Mayor Tracy Jones at 6:00 p.m. Councilmembers Bryce Butcher, Gerhart Hanson, Andrew Hemphill, and Gregory Koch were present. Cari Johnson, City Clerk/Treasurer, was present.

The Pledge of Allegiance was recited.

COUNCILMEMBER KOCH MADE THE MOTION TO APPROVE THE AGENDA AS PRESENTED. MAYOR JONES SECONDED THE MOTION. ROLL CALL VOTE – JONES, BUTCHER, HANSON, HEMPHILL, AND KOCH VOTED AYE. THE MOTION CARRIED.

Mayor Jones requested a motion of approval of the Consent Agenda including meeting minutes of the November 14, 2023 Council Meeting, December 12, 2023 Special Council Meeting, and December 21, 2023 Special Council Meeting and the Treasurer's Report from April 2024: Checking Beginning Balance \$1,042,285.17 and Ending Balance \$1,027,911.71; Receipts to General fund \$21,854.23, Sewer fund \$15,804.63, Total \$37,658.86; and Claims for Approval: \$91,123.34 including Pine River State Bank checks #61337 to #61421 and automatic withdrawals #330790 to #330794; Investments \$396,630.64; Total Checking/Investments \$1,424,542.35. COUNCILMEMBER KOCH MADE THE MOTION TO APPROVE THE CONSENT AGENDA. COUNCILMEMBER HEMPHILL SECONDED THE MOTION. ROLL CALL VOTE – JONES, BUTCHER, HANSON, HEMPHILL, AND KOCH VOTED AYE. THE MOTION CARRIED.

SPEAKERS: Richard Baum submitted a request for dust control on the shoulder of Bloomquist Drive because ATVs are making dust.

PUBLIC FORUM: Jan Mosman, 44483 State Highway 6, reported GoNorthMN received two grants. Mosman reported one grant is to provide a free dinner and theater event later this summer. The goal of the theater event is to invite discussion on what everyone likes in the City and topics where attendees disagree and should hear the other side. The actors will use the information to present an improvisational comedy event. The Sketches of Minnesota event will be held on Friday, July 26, 2024 in the Emily City Hall Gymnasium with food provided by three local restaurants. Donations may be made at the event and will be split between the Emily Area Food Shelf, invasive species management in City lakes, and GoNorthMN projects. Mosman reported the second grant received was from Crow Wing Power for electrical improvements to the historic post office and old log cabin, including outlets and lights.

Lynn Kosloske, Secretary/Treasurer, Northern Lights Over Roosevelt Lake Homeowner's Association Board, reported on October 3, 2023 the Board requested two modifications to the conditions of the 2009 Northern Lights Over Roosevelt Lake final plat at a Planning Commission meeting. Kosloske reported the Board requested modifications to the docking storage location and the parking on the west side of State Highway 6. At the meeting the Board representatives were informed the Minnesota Department of Transportation (MnDOT) and the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources (DNR) required the current docking storage and parking regulations in 2009, the Board would need to seek approval from both entities, and, if approved, the Board would need to come back to the Planning Commission for approval of the changes. The Board was notified that MnDOT reviewed the request and made the following decisions:

- MnDOT will allow daytime parking outside the roadside clear zone, which is measured from the edge of
 the traveling lane (white line) and is 42' from the white line of the nearest lane at this location. No
 overnight parking will be allowed and MnDOT will be posting "no overnight parking" signs at the location.
- MnDOT will allow the Board to build an 8' to 10' wide access across the ditch to provide trail access to
 State Highway 6 from the development. The ditch in the area is part of the ATV trail and is continually in
 disrepair and is usually not in the best condition for walking across. MnDOT will place pedestrian crossing

- ahead signs in advance of the crossing. The Board has applied for a MnDOT permit to construct the access and will be completing the access as soon as possible.
- MnDOT will allow the dock to be placed along the shoreline of the lake for winter storage. The Board will not allow lifts on the shoreline. The lifts will be removed by property owners and placed at residences in the development.

Kosloske reported the Board feels the parking location is adequate for their needs for ATVs, side-by-sides, and golf carts. Kosloske reported the Board feels automobiles should be allowed for pick up and drop off only with no day parking of automobiles to remain in compliance with MnDOT requirements.

Kosloske reported the Board contacted the DNR and the Crow Wing County Hydrologist for approval of the new dock layout on Roosevelt Lake and a copy of the layout has been provided to the City. The approved dock layout must remain in compliance with the requirements for no more than 16 boat slips per the Northern Lights Over Roosevelt Lake final plat and the Board does not excavate or pull out vegetation.

Kosloske reported the Board is requesting the City Council approve modification to Northern Lights Over Roosevelt Lake final plat Condition #16 to allow dock storage on the shoreline and Condition #21(A) allowing day parking 42' from the nearest white line of State Highway 6. Kosloske asked if the Board would have to request approval for completing ditch modifications in State Highway 6 right-of-way if approved by MnDOT.

Jan Peterschick, 21379 Evening Star Lane, reported being appreciative of the Planning Commission for their consideration of the MnDOT and DNR approved modifications to the Northern Lights Over Roosevelt Lake final plat conditions.

FIRST RESPONSE UNIT: Chief Cary LeBlanc reported the May First Response Unit meeting was held with 9 members present and reported 8 calls in April. Trainings on cardiac arrest and documentation were completed. Combination of the Fire Department and First Response Unit was discussed. MAYOR JONES MADE THE MOTION TO TABLE CONFIRMATION OF FIRST RESPONSE UNIT ELECTION RESULTS PENDING FIRE AND RESCUE DEPARTMENT ORDINANCE COMPLETION. COUNCILMEMBER HEMPHILL SECONDED THE MOTION. ROLL CALL VOTE – JONES, BUTCHER, HANSON, HEMPHILL, AND KOCH VOTED AYE. THE MOTION CARRIED.

FIRE DEPARTMENT: Council Liaison Butcher reported the April Fire Department meeting was held with 13 members present and reported 1 fire call. All equipment and SCBAs were checked.

MAYOR JONES MADE THE MOTION TO APPROVE THE EMILY FIREMEN'S RELIEF ASSOCIATION APPLICATION FOR 1 DAY TEMPORARY ON-SALE INTOXICATING LIQUOR LICENSE FOR SATURDAY, JUNE 15, 2024 IN THE EMILY BASEBALL FIELD PARK FOR A SOFTBALL TOURNAMENT, SUBJECT TO PUBLIC SAFETY COMMISSIONER APPROVAL. COUNCILMEMBER HEMPHILL SECONDED THE MOTION. ROLL CALL VOTE – JONES, BUTCHER, HANSON, HEMPHILL, AND KOCH VOTED AYE. THE MOTION CARRIED.

COUNCILMEMBER KOCH MADE THE MOTION TO THE APPROVE EMILY FIREMEN'S RELIEF ASSOCIATION APPLICATION FOR 1 DAY TEMPORARY ON-SALE INTOXICATING LIQUOR LICENSE FOR SATURDAY, JULY 20, 2024 IN THE EMILY DOWNTOWN CITY PARK FOR EMILY DAY, SUBJECT TO PUBLIC SAFETY COMMISSIONER APPROVAL. COUNCILMEMBER HANSON SECONDED THE MOTION. ROLL CALL VOTE – JONES, BUTCHER, HANSON, HEMPHILL, AND KOCH VOTED AYE. THE MOTION CARRIED.

MAYOR JONES MADE THE MOTION TO APPROVE THE EMILY FIREMEN'S RELIEF ASSOCIATION APPLICATION FOR 1 DAY TEMPORARY ON-SALE INTOXICATING LIQUOR LICENSE FOR SATURDAY, AUGUST 10, 2024 IN THE EMILY BASEBALL FIELD PARK FOR A SOFTBALL TOURNAMENT, SUBJECT TO PUBLIC SAFETY COMMISSIONER APPROVAL. COUNCILMEMBER BUTCHER SECONDED THE MOTION. ROLL CALL VOTE – JONES, BUTCHER, HANSON, HEMPHILL, AND KOCH VOTED AYE. THE MOTION CARRIED.

MAYOR JONES MADE THE MOTION TO TABLE THE BY-LAWS OF THE EMILY VOLUNTEER FIRE DEPARTMENT REVISIONS INCLUDING ADDITION OF SECTION 11 CHILDREN AND SECTION 12 ANNUAL SCBA/N95 MASK FIT TEST AND SECTION RENUMBERING TO PROVIDE ADEQUATE NOTIFICATION OF FIRE DEPARTMENT MEMBERS AND PROVIDE TIME FOR ADDITIONAL WORK ON THE REVISIONS. COUNCILMEMBER HEMPHILL SECONDED THE MOTION. ROLL CALL VOTE – JONES, BUTCHER, HANSON, HEMPHILL, AND KOCH VOTED AYE. THE MOTION CARRIED.

LAW ENFORCEMENT: Council Liaison Butcher reported on Northern Outpost development including Midwest Security has been working on the Hall access/security system, the Northern Outpost has been painted, and the carpet should be installed soon in the Northern Outpost. MAYOR JONES MADE THE MOTION TO APPROVE QUOTES FOR CONTINUING DEVELOPMENT OF NORTHERN OUTPOST FOR THE SHERIFF'S OFFICE. COUNCILMEMBER BUTCHER SECONDED THE MOTION. THE MOTION FAILED FOR LACK OF VOTES. Furniture quotes were reviewed with a preference for American-made furniture and for all assembly, delivery, and installation to be included. There is currently a cabinet in the Northern Outpost, so the City does not plan to purchase a credenza. MAYOR JONES MADE THE MOTION TO APPROVE THE OFFICE SHOP FURNITURE QUOTE FOR A DESK, TWO TABLES, NINE OFFICE CHAIRS, LOUNGE (THREE PARTS), AND END TABLE, WITH NO CREDENZA IF REMOVAL OF THE CREDENZA DOES NOT RESULT IN THE LOSS OF THE 40% DISCOUNT, AND PURCHASE OF A 50" SMART TV AND WALL MOUNT FOR \$247.98 WITH SHIPPING FROM WALMART, USING \$4,240 FROM 228 POLICE FUND AND THE REMAINDER FROM THE 206 ARPA FUND. COUNCILEMBER KOCH SECONDED THE MOTION. ROLL CALL VOTE – JONES, BUTCHER, HANSON, HEMPHILL, AND KOCH VOTED AYE. THE MOTION CARRIED.

WASTEWATER: The Emily Wastewater Treatment Plant was inspected by the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency (MPCA) on March 8, 2024 with the City's Wastewater Operator. The MPCA reviewed the ponds, rip rap. control structures, groundwater well, and the rapid infiltration basins. The City has been planning to repair the rapid infiltration basins by repairing or replacing the broken or cut lateral distribution lines and replacing the sand to the proper depth. The City has also planned to replace the sagging rip rap with new rocks to get to the original operating depth. During the inspection it was determined a vent needs to be installed in the influent control structure due to corrosion to the concrete structure, manhole covers, and transfer gates. The City received a Wastewater Compliance Evaluation Inspection from the MPCA with ten documented violations of the terms and conditions set forth in the State Disposal System permit. Six violations and corrective actions were listed and the remaining four violations were serious and addressed in a separate Notice of Violation. The MPCA reported many missing reports and sample data from 2016 through 2021 from the prior Wastewater Operator. The missing reports and data include Discharge Monitoring Reports, Pond Observation Forms, and laboratory analysis reports. The MPCA's required corrective action within 30 days is finding and submitting as many of the missing reports/lab results as possible and submitting a description of how all reports and lab results will be submitted and/or collected on time in the future. The MPCA's required corrective action within 60 days is submitting a description of how and when the rapid infiltration basins will be repaired and submitting a description of how and when the concrete spalling in the influent transfer structure at the ponds will be repaired. The City has been working on finding or replacing missing reports and lab results. The MPCA is requiring the City's current Wastewater Operator to enter the missing documentation on the MPCA website. The Wastewater Operator submitted a list of planned 30 day and 60 day actions to use to develop the required response letter to the MPCA. COUNCILMEMBER KOCH MADE THE MOTION TO APPROVE SENDING A RESPONSE LETTER TO THE MPCA WITH THE PLANNED 30 DAY AND 60 DAY ACTIONS IN RESPONSE TO THE WASTEWATER COMPLIANCE EVALUATION INSPECTION AND NOTICE OF VIOLATION. COUNCILMEMBER BUTCHER SECONDED THE MOTION. ROLL CALL VOTE - JONES, BUTCHER, HANSON, HEMPHILL, AND KOCH VOTED AYE. THE MOTION CARRIED. The MPCA representative understands the City changed Wastewater Operators and is willing to work with the City regarding compliance. There is a possibility the MPCA will charge fines for the violations.

MAYOR JONES MADE THE MOTION TO APPROVE THE AGRICULTURAL HAULED WASTEWATER DISCHARGE PERMIT APPLICATION FROM AL'S SEWER FOR AGRICULTURAL FISH HATCHERY POND WASTE, PENDING WASTEWATER OPERATOR APPROVAL AND RECEIPT OF INSURANCE REQUIREMENTS. COUNCILMEMBER HEMPHILL SECONDED THE MOTION. ROLL CALL VOTE – JONES, BUTCHER, HANSON, HEMPHILL, AND KOCH VOTED AYE. THE MOTION CARRIED.

PLANNING & ZONING: Planning Commission Chair David Johnson presented the report from the May Planning Commission Meeting. COUNCILMEMBER KOCH MADE THE MOTION TO APPROVE REZONING A .44 ACRE SECTION OF THE 2.43 ACRE PROPERTY LOCATED AT 40099 HITE LANE, PID 21270704, PROPERTY OWNERS EUGENE AND ZAMIRA SELYUKOV, FROM NEIGHBORHOOD RESIDENTIAL TO SHORELINE RESIDENTIAL TO BRING THE LOT INTO ONE UNIFORM ZONING DISTRICT AS RECOMMENDED BY THE PLANNING COMMISSION, PENDING CITY ATTORNEY REVIEW AND DEVELOPMENT OF ALL NECESSARY DOCUMENTATION. MAYOR JONES SECONDED THE MOTION. ROLL CALL VOTE – JONES, BUTCHER, HANSON, HEMPHILL, AND KOCH VOTED AYE. THE MOTION CARRIED.

MAYOR JONES MADE THE MOTION TO ADOPT ORDINANCE 24-01 AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE LAND USE AND SUBDIVISIONS ORDINANCE AS IT RELATES TO THE WATER RESOURCE ZONING DISTRICT

WITH THE REMOVAL OF THE "WATER RESOURCE (WR)" ZONING DISTRICT AS RECOMMENDED BY THE PLANNING COMMISSION. COUNCILMEMBER KOCH SECONDED THE MOTION. ROLL CALL VOTE – JONES, BUTCHER, HANSON, HEMPHILL, AND KOCH VOTED AYE. THE MOTION CARRIED. MAYOR JONES MADE THE MOTION TO APPROVE THE SUMMARY OF ORDINANCE 24-01 AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE LAND USE AND SUBDIVISIONS ORDINANCE AS IT RELATES TO THE WATER RESOURCE ZONING DISTRICT WITH THE REMOVAL OF THE "WATER RESOURCE (WR)" ZONING DISTRICT FOR PUBLICATION. COUNCILMEMBER KOCH SECONDED THE MOTION. ROLL CALL VOTE – JONES, BUTCHER, HANSON, HEMPHILL, AND KOCH VOTED AYE. THE MOTION CARRIED.

COUNCILMEMBER KOCH MADE THE MOTION TO ADOPT ORDINANCE 24-02 AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE LAND USE AND SUBDIVISIONS ORDINANCE AS IT RELATES TO THE HIGHWAY MIXED-USE ZONING DISTRICT WITH UPDATE TO THE INTENT AND PURPOSE OF THE ZONING DISTRICT AS RECOMMENDED BY THE PLANNING COMMISSION. COUNCILMEMBER HANSON SECONDED THE MOTION. ROLL CALL VOTE – JONES, BUTCHER, HANSON, HEMPHILL, AND KOCH VOTED AYE. THE MOTION CARRIED. COUNCILMEMBER KOCH MADE THE MOTION TO APPROVE THE SUMMARY OF ORDINANCE 24-02 AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE LAND USE AND SUBDIVISIONS ORDINANCE AS IT RELATES TO THE HIGHWAY MIXED-USE ZONING DISTRICT WITH UPDATE TO THE INTENT AND PURPOSE OF THE ZONING DISTRICT FOR PUBLICATION. COUNCILMEMBER HANSON SECONDED THE MOTION. ROLL CALL VOTE – JONES, BUTCHER, HANSON, HEMPHILL, AND KOCH VOTED AYE. THE MOTION CARRIED.

The Council discussed the requested modifications to the conditions of the Northern Lights Over Roosevelt Lake final plat by the Northern Lights Over Roosevelt Lake Homeowner's Association Board. MAYOR JONES MADE THE MOTION TO ADOPT RESOLUTION 24-22 ADOPTING MODIFIED CONDITIONS FOR EXISTING FINAL PLAT (APPLICATION NUMBER 09-3327) FROM 2009 ON BEHALF OF NORTHERN LIGHTS OVER ROOSEVELT LAKE HOMEOWNER'S ASSOCIATION TO MODIFY THE ORIGINAL CONDITIONS THAT REGULATED THE DOCKING STORAGE LOCATION AND PARKING ON THE WEST SIDE OF STATE HIGHWAY 6 ON THE PROPERTY LOCATED AT NORTHERN LIGHTS OVER ROOSEVELT LAKE PLAT, WITH ADDITIONAL MODIFICATIONS TO THE CONDITIONS AS FOLLOWS:

- #16 REVISED TO: DOCKS SHALL BE ALLOWED TO BE STORED ON-SITE ON THE SHORELINE AND
 WALKING PATH EACH YEAR WITH EFFORTS MADE TO STORE THE DOCKS OUT OF CLEAR VIEW
 FROM THE LAKE.
- ADDITION OF #17: LIFTS SHALL BE PROFESSIONALLY REMOVED BY THE ASSOCIATION PROPERTY OWNERS AND MOVED FOR STORAGE TO THEIR PLACE OF RESIDENCE IN THE NORTHERN LIGHTS OVER ROOSEVELT LAKE DEVELOPMENT.
- #22 (A) REVISED TO: THE NORTH APPROACH/DROP OFF AREA WILL BE ALLOWED AS OUTLINED BY MNDOT IN THEIR LETTERS DATED APRIL 3, 2024 AND APRIL 19, 2024, ATTACHED AS EXHIBIT A.
- ADDITION OF #23: DAY PARKING FOR ATVS, UTVS, AND GOLF CARTS SHALL BE ALLOWED 42 FEET FROM THE NEAREST WHITE LINE ON STATE HIGHWAY 6.
- ADDITION OF #24: DROP OFF AND PICK UP SHALL BE ALLOWED WITH MOTORIZED VEHICLES ONLY.
- ADDITION OF #25: NO DAY PARKING SHALL BE ALLOWED FOR AUTOMOBILES AND TRUCKS.
- ADDITION OF #30: THE SHORELINE IS TO REMAIN IN ITS NATURAL STATE. NO CLEARING ALLOWED.
- ADDITION OF #31: EFFORTS SHALL BE MADE TO LIMIT WATER FLOW DOWN THE WALKING PATH TO AVOID RUNOFF AND EROSION.

COUNCILMEMBER HEMPHILL SECONDED THE MOTION. Discussion included the City Attorney will research whether a Conditional Use Permit (CUP) for the project was granted and recorded in 2009. If a CUP was granted, then the new CUP will merely contain these new modifications. If not, a new CUP including all of the 2009 conditions, plus modifications as approved by MnDOT and the DNR, will be needed. Per the City Attorney the Homeowner's Association will need to apply for a CUP either way if the final plat condition modifications are approved. MAYOR JONES MADE THE MOTION TO AMEND THE MOTION TO INCLUDE PENDING CITY ATTORNEY REVIEW AND CONDITIONED ON A CONDITIONAL USE PERMIT (CUP) BEING APPLIED FOR, GRANTED, AND THE CUP BEING RECORDED WITH CROW WING COUNTY WITH ADDITIONAL MODIFICATIONS TO THE CONDITIONS AS FOLLOWS:

• ADDITION OF #26: NO OVERNIGHT PARKING SHALL BE ALLOWED. COUNCILMEMBER HEMPHILL SECONDED THE AMENDMENT. ROLL CALL VOTE – JONES, BUTCHER, HANSON, HEMPHILL, AND KOCH VOTED AYE. THE MOTION CARRIED.

The Northern Lights Over Roosevelt Lake Homeowner's Association Board will request the signage along the trail on the west side of State Highway 6 near the shore directing no ATVs and no motor vehicles to the lakeshore to remain. MnDOT is going to remove the "No Parking" signs and install "No Overnight Parking" signs.

The Council reviewed the Lot Line Adjustment Application and Lot Split/Subdivision/Rezoning Application revisions.

The Council reviewed the structural engineer's report for review of standard door cut between the Planning and Zoning Office and the Clerk's Office. The report will be used by contractors to develop quotes for the work.

ATTORNEY: The City Attorney made the determination that Public Safety Aid funds are eligible to be used for purchase of electronic speed signs. MAYOR JONES MADE THE MOTION TO REQUEST QUOTES FOR TWO ELECTRONIC SPEED SIGNS TO BE PURCHASED WITH PUBLIC SAFETY AID FUNDS. COUNCILMEMBER BUTCHER SECONDED THE MOTION. Discussion included MnDOT will be contacted for their approved sign options. ROLL CALL VOTE – JONES, BUTCHER, HANSON, HEMPHILL, AND KOCH VOTED AYE. THE MOTION CARRIED.

MAYOR JONES MADE THE MOTION TO APPROVE THE DATA PRACTICES POLICY FOR MEMBERS OF THE PUBLIC. COUNCILMEMBER KOCH SECONDED THE MOTION. ROLL CALL VOTE – JONES, BUTCHER, HANSON, HEMPHILL, AND KOCH VOTED AYE. THE MOTION CARRIED.

ROADS: Remaining American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds of \$45,898.54 need to be expended or allocated to an eligible use by December 31, 2024. Purchase of a Maintenance truck would be an eligible use of ARPA funds. Discussion included last year the City saved \$40,000 in Police Department funds to purchase a Maintenance truck in 2024. Discussion also included repurposing the \$40,000 saved for the truck to save for law enforcement costs in 2025. COUNCILMEMBER KOCH MADE THE MOTION TO PURCHASE A 2024 F250 4X4 SUPER CAB PICKUP TRUCK WITH 6.75' BOX UNDER STATE COOPERATIVE PURCHASING VENTURE CONTRACT FOR TOTAL OF \$51,577.45 FOR THE MAINTENANCE DEPARTMENT USING REMAINING ARPA FUNDS NOT DEDICATED TO NORTHERN OUTPOST FURNITURE WITH THE BALANCE COMING FROM THE \$40,000 SAVED FOR THE TRUCK AND SAVE THE REMAINDER OF THE \$40,000 FOR LAW ENFORCEMENT COSTS IN 2025. COUNCILMEMBER HEMPHILL SECONDED THE MOTION. ROLL CALL VOTE – JONES, BUTCHER, HANSON, HEMPHILL, AND KOCH VOTED AYE. THE MOTION CARRIED. The truck is anticipated to be received in six months.

Contractors working at 19478 Blue Lane East have damaged the pavement. The project is not complete, so additional damage may occur. There was a discussion on notification of land use permittees to require contractors not to damage City roads and the condition of City roads. Once the project is complete the City will consider charging the property owner to repair the damage. The issue was tabled for the Maintenance Supervisor to continue to inspect during construction.

MAYOR JONES MADE THE MOTION TO APPROVE THE AGREEMENT FOR PROFESSIONAL SERVICES FOR S.E.H. TO COMPLETE PRELIMINARY ENGINEERING FOR ROOSEVELT DRIVE BRIDGE REPLACEMENT, INCLUDING HYDRAULICS ANALYSIS, WETLAND DELINEATION AND PERMITTING, AND DEVELOPMENT OF PRELIMINARY PLANS, FOR \$49,994. COUNCILMEMBER BUTCHER SECONDED THE MOTION. ROLL CALL VOTE – JONES, BUTCHER, HANSON, HEMPHILL, AND KOCH VOTED AYE. THE MOTION CARRIED.

MAINTENANCE: Maintenance Supervisor Brian Foster reported replacing culverts, hauling Class 5, cutting trees, Brush Dump work, parks work, working on ballfields, and general maintenance. The Council requested a plan of the larger action items for the year for review. Volunteers have been staffing the Brush Dump on Saturdays. Emily property owners may contact the Maintenance Supervisor to open the Brush Dump during the week if needed.

CITY HALL: The hydration station has been installed and is operational. The hydration station was provided through a partner award from SHIP Crow Wing Energized.

CEMETERY: Council Liaison Hanson reported two lots sold and one burial: Jessie Guelich.

PARKS: The plan is for Seasonal Maintenance personnel to repair the dugouts using Park funds.

Park Commissioner Koch reported the Park Commission established priorities and has a plan for a phased approach to completion. Phase one is construction of two pickleball courts at the City Hall Park on the west side of the building. Additional phases may include a pavilion, outdoor volleyball court, additional pickleball court, shuffleboard court, or outdoor handball court. The Park Commission did not include a band shell due to the high cost of construction and required work involved with setting up and holding concerts. Quotes were received for

Phase One construction of the two pickleball courts. The public has been working on requesting donations for the pickleball courts. COUNCILMEMBER BUTCHER MADE THE MOTION TO USE \$40,000 IN PARK DEDICATION FUNDS TO CONSTRUCT TWO PICKLEBALL COURTS AND USE DONATIONS FOR THE REMAINDER OF THE CONSTRUCTION COSTS. MAYOR JONES SECONDED THE MOTION. COUNCILMEMBER BUTCHER AMENDED THE MOTION TO INCLUDE ACCEPTANCE OF PICKLEBALL COURT CONSTRUCTION QUOTES AS FOLLOWS:

- ANDERSON BROTHERS FOR CONSTRUCTION OF THE COURTS FOR \$26,097
- OBERG FENCE FOR INSTALLATION OF THE FENCING FOR \$10,694
- OUTDOOR SPECIALTIES LLC FOR INSTALLATION OF THE POSTS AND NETS AND SURFACE PAINTING FOR \$20,480

MAYOR JONES SECONDED THE AMENDMENT. ROLL CALL VOTE - JONES, BUTCHER, HANSON, HEMPHILL, AND KOCH VOTED AYE. THE MOTION CARRIED.

The City plans to request grant funds for construction of a concrete pad near the pickleball courts for picnic tables and/or a pavilion next year.

The scoreboard has been installed at the Baseball Field Park and is operational.

Crow Wing County reported work continues at the Little Emily Lake Park. The contractor is starting to move in equipment and will be hauling materials this week. Construction will focus on the parking lot, swimming beach, and the walking trails. The park is closed during active construction.

LIBRARY: No report.

PERSONNEL: No report.

EMILY WATERS: No report.

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT: No report.

CODIFICATION: No report.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS: Rick Sandri, North Star Manganese (NSM), provided a report. Sandri reported Electric Metals announced preliminary results from the new Resource Estimate, based on the 2023 drilled portion of the Emily Deposit, prepared by Forte Dynamics, Inc. Sandri reported the summary results. Sandri reported the tonnages show a significant increase in drilled mineralization over previous studies. The final report will be listed on SEDAR in May. Electric Metals released preliminary metallurgical results based on the testing and analysis of drilled samples being assessed at Kemetco Research. Kemetco's current direct leaching approach has resulted in successfully achieving high manganese extractions of more than 90% using a reductant. Sandri reported the final flow sheet is still in optimization. The current Kemetco work is expected to be completed by this summer, but additional metallurgical work will continue through mid-2024. Environmental visits associated with site reclamation (regrowth in disturbed areas), have continued and the site reclamation and regrowth is occurring as planned by Barr Engineering. As the weather gets warmer, the environmental visits associated with site reclamation will be increased after rain event periods (rainfall of more than ½ inch in a 24 hour period). NSM continued its discussions with the DNR on its mineral lease applications on certain State mineral lands in the Emily area. This activity will be ongoing into 2024.

The Council reviewed the many submissions for the City Slogan Contest. The Council will each choose three to five slogans and the selections will be reviewed at the next meeting.

The Council had planned on submitting a Sourcewell Community Impact Funds grant application to purchase and install a generator at City Hall, but the generator quotes came in higher than the grant amount and the City did not have a budget for the remainder of the cost. As an alternative solution a grant application has been developed to replace the audio and video equipment in the Council Chambers, purchase a sweeper vacuum for the Maintenance Shop, and purchase and install a two post hydraulic lift in the Maintenance Shop. Purchase of the items has been delayed for years due to lack of budget funds. The grant applications are chosen through a lottery process. COUNCILMEMBER KOCH MADE THE MOTION TO ADOPT RESOLUTION 24-20 FOR SUBMISSION OF COMMUNITY IMPACT FUNDS GRANT APPLICATION TO SOURCEWELL TO APPLY FOR A GRANT FOR PURCHASE AND INSTALLATION OF AUDIO AND VIDEO EQUIPMENT IN THE CITY HALL COUNCIL

CHAMBERS AND PURCHASE OF A SWEEPER VACUUM AND PURCHASE AND INSTALLATION OF A TWO POST HYDRAULIC LIFT FOR THE MAINTENANCE SHOP IN 2024 FOR A TOTAL OF \$48,573.98. COUNCILMEMBER HEMPHILL SECONDED THE MOTION. ROLL CALL VOTE – JONES, BUTCHER, HANSON, HEMPHILL, AND KOCH VOTED AYE. THE MOTION CARRIED.

The Council reviewed the Annual SLFRF Compliance P&E Report for 2024 for ARPA funds use. The Council made the decision to use the remaining ARPA funds for the furniture for the Northern Outpost and a new Maintenance truck.

NEW BUSINESS: The City of Crosslake is working with their City Engineer on a Safe Streets and Roads for All (SS4A) Planning Grant and has a better chance for approval with the support of additional cities. The City's involvement would be participating in meetings during the development of the plan. The purpose of the plan would be to improve pedestrian safety in the area with the possibility of the development of connecting trails between Crosslake, Fifty Lakes, and Emily. COUNCILMEMBER BUTCHER MADE THE MOTION TO ADOPT RESOLUTION 24-21 REGARDING SS4A PLANNING GRANT TO APPROVE BEING A CO-APPLICANT AND PARTICIPANT IN THE SAFE STREETS AND ROADS FOR ALL (SS4A) PROGRAM TO STUDY PEDESTRIAN SAFETY IN THE AREA AND DEVELOP A VULNERABLE USER PLAN WITH THE CITY OF CROSSLAKE BEING THE FISCAL AGENT, NO FINANCIAL OBLIGATION FROM EMILY, AND MEETING PARTICIPATION. COUNCILMEMBER HEMPHILL SECONDED THE MOTION. ROLL CALL VOTE – JONES, BUTCHER, HANSON, HEMPHILL, AND KOCH VOTED AYE. THE MOTION CARRIED.

CORRESPONDENCE: Discussion included State Auditor regarding a Performance Measurement Program and Crow Wing County Historical Society regarding a thank you for the donation.

SCHEDULED UPCOMING MEETINGS: The next meeting with the Fire Chief/Assistant Chief, First Responder Chief/Assistant Chief, and Council Liaisons to update the City Code to combine the departments is planned for Tuesday, May 28, 2024 at 4 p.m.

COUNCILMEMBER BUTCHER MADE THE MOTION TO ADJOURN THE MEETING AT 8:05 P.M. MAYOR JONES SECONDED THE MOTION. ROLL CALL VOTE – JONES, BUTCHER, HANSON, HEMPHILL, AND KOCH VOTED AYE. THE MOTION CARRIED.


OUR FINANCIAL CHALLENGES

The Crosby-Ironton School District has worked hard to balance its budget over the past decade and minimize the impact of increasing financial challenges on students. Despite cutting \$718,000 from our operating budget this year, we face a growing deficit that threatens our ability to provide a high-quality education.

- State funding has not kept pace with inflation or the educational needs of our students. Today, districts across the state are getting comparatively less funding than 20 years ago. The state's funding formula has not kept pace with the rising costs of education or the rate of inflation. The amount of funding our district receives from the state does not support the needs of our students, leaving the district to manage a budget deficit for nearly a decade.
- Over 70% of school districts in Minnesota rely on voter-approved operating levies to provide additional funding for schools. Our district does not have an operating levy. Last year, district voters rejected a proposed operating levy by 35 votes. As a result, we cut \$718,000 from our operating budget. These cuts increased class sizes in kindergarten and second grade, cut back on extracurricular activities, and limited supplies and services that support student learning.
- Our district has managed costs carefully to avoid deep budget cuts but is currently operating in a deficit. We face a \$1 million deficit, which is expected to grow to over \$1.5 million within the next 10 years. Without additional funding, our district won't be able to maintain class sizes, staffing levels, curriculum, programming and activities.







Friday, September 20, 2024 - Morning Class Descriptions 8 am - 12 pm

Classes #1-6 (pick 1)

- 1. First Arriving Engine Company (Task Force 1): It's in your first due. You're first arriving. It's game on. As the boss, you expect a stellar performance from your crew. Firefighters stretch, get the kinks out and get water on the fire quickly. A fast knockdown if the engine operator does his magic. That's what it should look like. However, for some it is wishful thinking. Executing the fundamentals and having a good boss will make the difference. Want to excel as the first arriving engine? Expect nothing less. This program will help you get to the next level.
- 2. Barn Fires. What's Inside? (Task Force 1): Barns have been used to house farm animals and hay. However, today that is not the case. They may be used as venues for weddings, converted into residential dwellings or used as a base of operations for clandestine drug manufacturing. Because of their size, contents, and location, when they burn, they do it with reckless abandon. Gain an understanding of building construction, fire flow estimations, strategy and tactics, to help improve overall fireground operations at a barn fire.
- 3. Customer Service in Today's Fire & EMS Delivery (Task Force 1): Fire and EMS delivery is a business. Your customer is the person who calls 911. They are experiencing an emergency and need your help. How you treat them and deliver services becomes part of your organization's reputation. Often an organization's culture has hardened its members. It makes them callous to everyone often taking it out on the customer. Learn how to deliver world class customer service from your fire and EMS organization.
- 4. Investment Wisdom for Relief Association Trustees (Parr McKnight): The Parr McKnight Wealth Management Group has over 30 years of experience serving the unique needs of over 100 fire relief associations in MN. New and experienced trustees can gain valuable knowledge and insight from their perspective and approach. The majority of the class will cover topics including investment basics, understanding your fiduciary responsibilities, how to develop and implement your investment policy statement, investing psychology, and a first-hand analysis of your benefit level and strategies for working with your city to consistently and responsibly raise it over time. Parr McKnight will wrap up the class by discussing personal retirement planning topics including how to prepare for retirement, funding retirement, and pension basics.
- 5. We're the State, and We're Here to Help (Minnesota State Fire Marshal Division): From our dedicated State Emergency Response Teams to our thorough investigations and extensive MFIRS data, the Minnesota Department of Public Safety State Fire Marshal (SFM) division is committed to supporting the fire service and communities in Minnesota. Want to learn about the capabilities and see the varieties of tools and instrumentation a State Hazmat Team carries? Want to hear more about how our investigators determine a fire's cause and origin? How can your department leverage data to make your community safer? If you have wondered how we can support your department, this is the session for you.
- 6. Understanding the ISO Process [Verisk]: You have had your ISO evaluation completed and have the results or you are about to prepare for your first time. Now what? Not only will this course give an overview of the grading schedule, we will also talk about Auto Aid vs Mutual Aid adding Hauled Water to your evaluation, access to MITIGATE and more. You will gain understanding of ways to improve the PPC score for your community, prepare for an evaluation and learn more about the ISO process.

 *This class is recommended for Fire Officers.

Friday, September 20, 2024 - Afternoon Class Descriptions 1 pm – 5 pm

Classes #7-12 (pick 1)

- 7. Flashovers, Backdrafts and Other Bad Stuff (Task Force 1): The fireground is dangerous. From the start of the fire to extinguishment, we will review what causes fire to grow, spread and eventually be extinguished. Flashovers, backdrafts, smoke explosions are just some bad things you may encounter. Learn what you are up against and how to improve overall fireground safety.
- 8. Rural Fireground Operations (Task Force 1): Rural is the environment for a large chunk of the country with no hydrants on street corners, narrow two or single lane roads. If they are paved if you're lucky. Water supply challenges, longer responses and access issues can be expected. With all that said, don't throw in the towel. Lose the rural, defeatist attitude. With good leadership, clear response guidelines and well-trained officers and firefighters, successful and effective rural operations are possible.
- 9. Light Staffed Engine and Truck Companies (Task Force 1): Staffed with two or three 3 personnel can be discouraging and challenging but that is real-world for many! However, by focusing on incident priorities, making some subtle operational changes with each company, results can be astounding!
- 10. Fire Investigation for Firefighters (Minnesota State Fire Marshal Division): This class will give you a basic overview of how a fire investigator works toward establishing the origin and cause of a fire. The class will include basic principles of investigations along with ways firefighters can help the fire chief or investigator preserve a scene as best as possible. This class will include real-life examples and stories that will expand your knowledge of the science behind investigations.
- 11. Office of the State Auditor Relief Association Training (OSA): The Office of the State Auditor's training will cover important topics to help relief association trustees be successful in administering their pension plans. The topics will include how to avoid common compliance issues that could result in a delay of your fire state aid and learn about new laws that affect your relief association that were passed in recent legislative sessions. There will also be an opportunity for a Q and A with our Pension Division staff, who will be ready to answer your questions including how municipal contributions are determined, how to change benefit levels, and questions about your bylaws. Additionally, staff with the Minnesota Department of Revenue will be in attendance and provide an overview of fire state aid programs.
- 12. LivingWorks safeTALK [MnFIRE]: The statistics are well-known: Police, paramedics and firefighters are at a higher risk of dying by suicide than the average citizen. LivingWorks suicide prevention training adds a layer of support, within workplace and social networks, which can help first responders with practice and appropriate action plans to help keep their peers and the community safer from suicide. LivingWorks safeTALK is a four-hour training that equips firefighters to be more alert to someone thinking of suicide and better able to connect them with further help.

Saturday, September 21, 2024 - Class Descriptions 8 am - 12 pm

Classes #13-18 (pick 1)

- 13. Managing Risks (Task Force 1): This presentation will share insights on how to manage risks in your organization. It will urge the participants to do an introspection of their own organization. From emergency operations to station management, the challenge is to "what if" this happens in your organization encouraging a hard look at eliminating or minimizing risk. Sound operating guidelines, good business practices, fireground operations and training are a large part of risk management.
- 14 Incident Commander (Task Force 1): The incident commander is the ultimate decision-making authority on the fireground. While he may be a Fire Chief, at other times he may be a company officer or even a firefighter. This individual is responsible for making strategic decisions and ensuring adequate resources are available to support tactical actions. In this presentation we will talk about span of control, strategy, tactics, fireground accountability, safety, and sound command practices.
- 15. Fixing Fireground Dysfunction (Task Force 1): Many fireground operations are chaotic, dysfunctional, and dangerous. Often an attempt to fix the problem is throwing a lot of resources at it hoping it will get better. Why the dysfunction? It can be lack of training. For others it is lack of standardization. Perhaps it's a lack of leadership and direction. In this presentation, we will share sound strategies and best practices to help fix your dysfunctional fireground.
- 16. Traffic Incident Management [Chief Judy Thill]: Many firefighters feel more unsafe working along a roadway than they do going into a burning building! All public safety personnel, not just firefighters, as well as their vehicles, continue to get struck at scenes at an alarming rate. In addition to being hit at the scene, first responders have also been killed traveling to emergency calls. Learn what to look out for when responding to and working at scenes, along with how to best communicate, coordinate and cooperate with other responders. The goal is to make sure everyone, including the traveling public, has the opportunity to go home when the call is done. *LEO can earn 3 POST credits for this class.
- 17. Modern-Day Recruiter Class (Capstone): Recruiting new candidates for your department requires a plan and new techniques to attract them to your purpose. Retaining your current firefighters requires a plan too. This class will assist you in better understanding new practices for attracting, hiring, onboarding, training, and retaining firefighters. You will learn about finding your target market, using social media, interviewing, establishing Explorer programs, and more.
- 18. Relief Trustee Basics (Ed Hoffman MSFDA/Doug Anderson PERA): This class is for the new Relief Trustee or an existing Trustee that wants to learn more about Relief Associations. The topics covered will include: what is a relief association, the responsibilities of the association and its trustees, the different types of relief associations in MN, an overview of the laws that apply to relief's, investment options and bylaws. A representative from PERA will be available to discuss the Statewide Volunteer Firefighters (SVF) Plan. *Bring your Association Bylaws and Records

Wastewater Operation & Maintenance


- Lift Station Maintenance checks were performed weekly on-site, and daily via the internet. Daily flow numbers are recorded and used for MPCA monthly operations reports.



The end of the summer has been quite busy. Again, the staff, Land Use Ordinance Subcommittee and Planning Commission are a treat for me to work with. All of them are bright, active, and quite knowledgeable of the issues, and it keeps me on my toes. They are a big assist, and in fact they lead, as we see our way through some interesting issues.

In the day to day office work we have had a flurry of applications, thankfully most of them have not needed additional action, such as CUPs or Variances. Many are run of the mill new construction or expansion, but a few have made us take out our thinking caps and work with the citizens to adjust plans to work within the requirements.

Again, this month, for the Planning Commission (and Land Use Ordinance Subcommittee) the chief item of discussion was the Cannabis Business Ordinance. Last night the Planning Commission called for a Public Hearing in October, and the City Council should see an actionable Cannabis Ordinance either at your October meeting, or the November meeting. Many hours of work have been put into this endeavor.

As we get towards winter, Sue and I are compiling a list of items we see in the code that we think may need further discussion, refection or research as the world continues to change, and as we have time over the winter we will bring those items to the Planning Commission for review and discussion.

A RESOLUTION ADOPTING MODIFIED CONDITIONS FOR EXISTING FINAL PLAT (APPLICATION NUMBER 09-3327) FROM 2009 ON BEHALF OF NORTHERN LIGHTS OVER ROOSEVELT LAKE HOMEOWNER'S ASSOCIATION

WHEREAS, on May 14, 2024 the Emily City Council reviewed an application to modify the original conditions for an existing final plat (application number 09-3327) that regulated the docking storage location and parking on the West side of State Highway 6 on behalf of: Northern Lights Over Roosevelt Lake Homeowner's Association, on the following property:

Legal Description: Northern Lights Over Roosevelt Lake Plat

Section 9- Township 138 -Range 26.

And.

WHEREAS, the Planning Commission has considered the applicant's request at a duly noticed Public Hearing which took place on May 7, 2024, and has recommended approval to the City Council; and,

Original Findings of Fact:

- 1. The applicant has complied with the conditions of the preliminary plat approval.
 - a. the applicant has submitted an exhibit of passive recreation facilities. the planning commission has accepted the drawing and its implementation has been included in the development agreement.
 - b. section 3.1, subpart e of the declarations indicates that all trails and walkways shall be constructed of wood chips or similar material.
 - c. section 3.1, subpart f of the declarations establishes the 50-foot vegetative buffer in outlot a and prohibits the clearing of live trees or brush in this buffer.
 - d. section 3.1, subpart g of the declarations prohibits vegetation removal in outlot a as pr the preliminary plat.
 - e. section 3.1, subpart h of the declarations restricts impacts to the ice ridge.
 - f. the applicant has submitted a plan for development on the west side of highway 6. the planning commission has accepted the plan.
 - g. section 2.12 of the declarations restrict the use of docking areas on roosevelt lake to lot owners.
 - h. section 2.12 of the declarations indicate that docks are to be removed annually.
 - i. section 2.12 of the declarations provides a mechanism agreeable to the planning commission for allocating rights to the mooring slips.
 - j. the applicant has prepared a stormwater pollution prevention plan. the plan has been reviewed and accepted by the planning commission.
 - k. the applicant has submitted a road plan that has been reviewed by the city engineer, the engineer's concerns have been resolved.
 - I. the portion of smokey hollow road that is owned by the applicant is being dedicated to the public as part of the subdivision.

- m. section 7.5 of the association documents limit the impervious coverage for each lot to that of the underlying zoning district.
- n. the swimming area and boardwalk have been eliminated from the submitted plans.
- o. section 2.12 of the declarations indicates that docks and lifts are to be stored off site or east of highway 6.
- p. section 2.12 of the declarations limits the number of boat slips to 16 and requires the establishment of a key card system.
- q. section 2.12 of the declarations requires the establishment of a no wake zone around the docking facility.
- r. section 2.12 of the declarations prohibits all recreational facilities on the west side of highway 6, with the exception of the 16 mooring slips.
- s. section 2.12 calls for property owners purchasing a mooring slip to receive information regarding best practices for safely crossing the highway.
- t. the applicant has coordinated improvements with mn/dot, which is requiring a \$10,000 security deposit to ensure the improvements are completed.
- u. crooked lake township has indicated that smokey hollow road is to have aggregate surfacing material added by the developer within the existing road section.
- v. section xx of the development agreement indicates that nothing will be burned in the preparation of the lots.
- 2. The final plat is in agreement with the approved preliminary plat.
- 3. The city attorney has completed review of the title work and found it to be acceptable.
- 4. There are no public improvements required on the property. the only public improvements are to highway 6, which are being handled by mn/dot.
- 5. A plat check by an independent land surveyor has been completed.
- 6. A financial security of \$5,000 will be provided for security on the construction of the lights and the erection of signs in the drop off area.

Original Conditions with Modifications as highlighted:

- To augment the existing submittals, the applicant shall provide an exhibit of passive recreation facilities within the development. This exhibit shall include the trails and shoreline recreation facilities submitted in previous drawings. Once this drawing has been accepted by the Planning Commission, the improvements shown will be used during the preparation of the development agreement.
- 2) Trails and walkways shall be constructed of wood chips or similar material so as to not increase the runoff from the trail surface.
- 3) The association documents will provide for a 50-foot vegetative buffer in Outlot A as depicted on the preliminary plat. Clearing of live trees or brush within this buffer shall be prohibited.

- 4) The association documents shall indicate that all buffers within Outlot A and lying between Highway 6 and Smokey Hollow Road will be maintained in their natural condition with no vegetative removal except for trails and forest management purposes. No clear cutting will be allowed.
- 5) The historic ice ridges shall not be damaged or diminished during the development process or in subsequent use of the property. This requirement, as well as the importance of the ice ridge in maintaining water quality, shall be clearly stated within the association documents.
- 6) The applicant shall submit a detailed plan for the improvements to the west side of Highway 6. Specifically identified must be:
 - a. Clearing limits,
 - b. Approach locations,
 - c. Wetland buffer areas.
 - d. Docking facilities, and
 - e. Mechanisms for erosion control during construction.

 The plan shall be in a form acceptable to the Planning
 Commission prior to application for final plat.
- 7) Association documents shall restrict the use of the docking areas on Roosevelt Lake solely for the use of lot owners.
- 8) Association documents shall reflect that all docks are to be seasonal (not permanent) and thus must be removed annually.
- 9) OMIT
- 10) Association documents shall provide a mechanism, agreeable to the Planning Commission, for allocating rights to the mooring slips.
- 11) The applicant shall prepare and provide to the City a stormwater pollution prevention plan for the entire development that is acceptable to the Planning Commission.
- 12)Roads within the subdivision shall be built to minimum City standards, but can remain privately maintained. Approvals from the Road Committee are required.
- 13) That portion of Smokey Hollow Road that lies within this development and is 33-feet south of the centerline of the roadway shall be dedicated to the public, if a 66-foot corridor is not already dedicated for this roadway.
- 14) Association documents shall indicate that the impervious coverage allowed on each lot shall be limited to the impervious coverage limitation of the underlying zoning district.
- 15) Eliminate the swimming area and the boardwalk from the plan.
- 16) Docks and lifts shall be allowed to be stored off on-site on the shoreline and walking path each year with efforts made to store the docks out of clear view from the lake.
- 17) Lifts shall be professionally removed by the Association property owners and moved for storage to their place of residence in the Northern Lights Over Roosevelt Lake development.
- 18) The number of boat slips will be limited to 16. To further control access to the docking facility, a lock or key-card system will be established to provide access to only those that have purchased one of the slips.
- 19) A no wake zone shall be established around the proposed docking facility.

20)All proposed recreational facilities on the west side of Highway 6, except for the 16 mooring slips, are prohibited.

21) Property owners that purchase mooring slips shall receive information

regarding best practices for safely crossing the highway.

22) The City will require that the developer continue to coordinate with Mn/DOT and that Mn/DOT's recommendations be implemented, including:

- a. The north approach/drop off area will be allowed as outlined by MnDOT in their letters dated April 3, 2024 and April 19, 2024, attached as Exhibit A.
- b. A northbound right turn lane and a southbound bypass lane must be constructed on TH 6 at the Smokey Hollow Road intersection.

c. Lighting and signs shall be installed as per Mn/DOT guidance.

- d. Roadway and safety appurtenances will be installed as per Mn/DOT guidance.
- e. Drainage patterns need to be perpetuated and erosion/ sediment controlled. A drainage plan must be submitted to Mn/DOT for review.

f. No drainage ponds will be allowed in the right of way.

g. There will be no net increase in development drainage to the highway right of way.

h. Proposed development signs must be located outside of the right of way.

No fences of structures are allowed in the right of way.

No excavation or grade changes are allowed in the right of way.

k. All Mn/DOT permits must be obtained.

23) Day parking for ATVs, UTVs, and golf carts shall be allowed 42 feet from the nearest white line on State Highway 6 and no closer than 75 feet from the lakeshore.

24) Automobiles and trucks may be used for drop off and pick up. Drop off and pick up shall be allowed with motorized vehicles only.

25) No day parking shall be allowed for automobiles and trucks. Automobiles and trucks are not allowed to park at any time.

26) No overnight parking shall be allowed for any type of vehicle.

- 27)All costs of compliance with Mn/DOT conditions shall be paid for by the developer.
- 28) The City of Emily will require, subject to acceptance by Crooked Lake Township within 90 days of preliminary plat approval, that the developer improve Smokey Hollow Road to Crooked Lake Township's standards up to the second entrance to the development. If Crooked Lake Township does not accept the improvements, no improvements to Smokey Hollow Road will be required.
- 29) The developer shall not burn anything related to its construction activities in preparing the platted lots for sale, including such things as the construction of the roads, parks, trails, and clearing of potential home sites by the Developer. The Developer, however, may haul, chip or bury it.

30) The shoreline is to remain in its natural state. No clearing allowed.

31) Efforts shall be made to limit water flow down the walking path to avoid runoff and erosion.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF EMILY, MINNESOTA AS FOLLOWS:

The application to modify the original conditions of the existing Northern Lights Over Roosevelt Lake Final Plat to regulate the docking storage location and parking on the West side of State Highway 6 is hereby approved, subject to the above listed conditions.



Emily Parks Commission Minutes

August 21, 2024

CALL TO ORDER:

The meeting was called to order by Chairperson Patrick Rheaume at 2:00 pm

Roll Call:

Gary Hanson, Patrick Rheaume, Wes Murnane, Greg Koch, Faye Hughes attending on-line

Agenda:

Motion: A motion to approve the agenda was made by commissioner Murnane and seconded by Greg Koch. The motion was unanimously approved

Meeting Minutes:

Motion: A motion to approve the April 29, 2024 meeting minutes was made by commissioner Murnane and seconded by Greg Koch. The motion was unanimously approved

PARKS COMMISSION MEMBER APPLICATION:

The City of Emily received an application to serve on the Emily Parks Commission from Karen Trenn. The commission discussed the applicant. While none of the Emily Parks commissioners knew Karen Trenn, they found no reason not to accept her application and forward it to Emily City Council for appointment approval.

Motion: A motion to accept Karen Trenn's application and forward it to Emily City Council for appointment approval was made by commissioner Koch and seconded by Wes Murnane. The motion was unanimously approved.

OLD BUSINESS:

Pickleball Courts:

Construction of the pickleball courts is nearing completion. The court pad, fence and net posts have been completed. The project has experienced some weather delays, but weather permitting, the courts will be painted and nets put up by the end of August.

Commissioners discussed putting up a single financial donor sign, and signs on each court stating the rules for court usage. The donor sign would be put up on the exterior court fence midway between the 2 courts, and court rules sign would be placed by the entry to each court.

Commissioners also discussed the need for a next up "Peacekeeper." The Peacekeeper is designed to track which player group is up next to play. It is a weather-proof pickleball paddle holder that identifies which player group is next in line to play, thus avoiding confusion and mitigating disagreements. This rack is mounted to the fence on the outside of the court.

Motion: A motion to approve 1 donor sign, 2 court rules signs, and 1 NEXTuP Peacekeeper was made by commission Koch and seconded by Wes Murnane. The motion was unanimously approved.

Ball Field Dugouts:

Re-siding the ballfield dugouts were approved by City Council. Unfortunately, the Maintenance Department is short-handed as one of the seasonal hires quit. It is unknown if the Maintenance Department crew will be tackling this project this year. The City Council will have to address this. No additional Park Commission action is required at this time.

Tennis Courts:

The outdoor tennis courts are unable to be effectively patched or repaired as the cracks in the court surface are too wide. Furthermore, the material that was used to patch the cracks now prevents re-surfacing adhering correctly. Basically, the courts are beyond repair.

Before prioritizing tennis court replacement, the commission would like to monitor how much use the tennis courts receive once the outdoor pickleball courts are open. Some, if not the majority, of tennis courts users were actually playing pickleball rather than tennis.

Grants Availability:

The next DNR Outdoor Recreation Grants Program will open in December 2024. The Outdoor Recreation grant is typically a 50/50 funding grant that could be as small as \$10k or as large as \$240k. The commission discussed having our final 2024 Parks Commission meeting in December once the 2025 DNR grant information is released.

Sourcewell also has a number of grant opportunities coming available. The upcoming grant programs are not open at this time, but they include the following:

Boost Funds

- Internship reimbursement

Match Funds

- Third-Party Services reimbursement

Impact Funds

- IEMS Training Reimbursement

Cooperative Purchasing

Phase Park & Recreation Development:

Phase I of the Park & Recreation development was to build 2 outdoor pickleball courts. That phase is nearly complete.

Phase II of the Park & Recreation development was to add a Picnic Shelter, sand volleyball court and a 3rd pickleball court

Phase III of the Park & Recreation development was to consider options for shuffleboard courts, and/or a splash pad

During previous commission meetings a bandshell was discussed and rejected as a costly and unsupportable endeavor. It would require a committee and event organizer to find bands and raise funds to pay the bands. Other ideas under consideration include an ice rink, a hockey rink,

and frisbee golf course. Each of these has various impediments that require further investigation.

NEW BUSINESS:

Emily Parks & Recreation Survey:

The commission discussed collecting information on what Park and Recreation features our citizens would like to see in Emily. As a means for collecting that information, the commission discussed creating a survey.

Action: Greg and Patrick will work on drafting a Parks and Recreation survey for review at the next Parks Commission meeting. Patrick took the lead on initiating the draft.

Gym floor repair:

Emily City Hall gym is a well-used, and great recreational asset to our community. The vinyl gym floor is starting to bubble up where the glue is no-longer holding the flooring down. The Parks Commission discussed budgeting money for repair or replacement of the flooring, however the gym is a City Hall asset and not a Parks and Recreation asset. The City Council is responsible for addressing the gym issues.

BUDGET:

Commission reviewed the 2025 preliminary Parks and Recreation Budget. The budget included an old carry-over line item of \$20k for an Emily City trail. This budget item dates back to when the Cuyuna Mountain Bike trail system was being developed. Commission members agreed that sticking with the Phased Park Plan was more appropriate. The \$20k should be budgeted for Phase II park plan items instead.

Action: Patrick took the action to work with the City Clerk to make that 2025 budget adjustment.

NEXT MEETING:

The commissioners agreed to having our next meeting around December, as there will be more information available on grant programs from the DNR and Sourcewell.

Action: Patrick took the action to work with the City Clerks to schedule the Park Commission meeting in December.

ADJOURNMENT:

Motion: Commissioner Murnane made the motion to adjourn, Greg Koch seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously at 3:04 pm.



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EMILY LIBRARY BOARD MEETING MINUTES August 27, 2024 Emily City Hall

Call to Order: Mikie Walker called the meeting to order at 1:14pm.

<u>Voting Members Present:</u> Mikie Walker, Diana Lee, Lori Bussler, Greg Koch (City Council Liaison)

Voting Member Absent: Jan Mosman

Also Present: Jane Davis (Library Director)

<u>Board Member Terms:</u> The Board reviewed a list of the current board members and their respective officer titles (if any) and term expiration dates. It was noted that all new terms going forward will be three-year terms, and that a few months before a board member's term expires, he/she needs to reapply at City Hall if he/she wishes to serve another three-year term.

2024 Book Sale: Jane reported that the book sale ran for two days (July 19-20) and brought in anonymous donation receipts of \$446.25.

Homebound Program: Jane reported that books cannot be delivered directly to homes of homebound seniors due to stringent background checks and other qualifications required for delivery people entering homes. She shared a flyer she created that she distributed to several locations to inform seniors that library materials are available to them if they have someone willing to pick up and return the items for them. The flyer contains the library email address for those interested in making arrangements.

<u>Purchase of People Counter:</u> Jane shared information relating to a wireless "people counter" gadget that she would like to purchase in order to track hourly statistics on how many people enter the library. It has infrared technology and the gadget would be affixed to the door jamb of the library door. After discussion, it was agreed that it would be helpful to know how many people use the library and whether there is a pattern for which days and hours are busier than others.

Upon motion made, seconded and unanimously carried, the board approved the purchase of a people counter, similar or identical to what was presented at the meeting, at a cost of approximately \$250.

Greg alerted the Board that Tremolo has grants available (through an application process) that may be helpful to the library for any technology-related items

needed. Jane indicated that the library computer does not need replacing and there are no technology items needed at this time.

<u>Security Camera for Library:</u> Greg reported that, under the City of Emily's Proposed Capital Improvement Plan, there is a \$500 line item in the budget for the purchase of a security camera for the library.

<u>Library Budget:</u> Jane distributed a copy of her draft of a "2025 Preliminary Budget" for the library, totaling \$6,155. The board reviewed and discussed the budget line by line and agreed to the following changes:

- Reduce "office supplies" from \$450 to \$300
- Eliminate the \$300 "legal fees" category since no need is anticipated, and there is a city attorney that could be called upon if the need arises
- Eliminate the \$60 "dues and subscriptions" category since no need is anticipated
- Total reduction \$510

Upon motion made, seconded and unanimously carried, the board approved the 2025 budget, as amended.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned at 2:15pm.

92.01 Definitions

§ 92.01 DEFINITIONS.

For the purpose of this chapter, the following definitions shall apply unless the context clearly indicates or requires a different meaning.

ANIMAL. Any mammal, reptile, amphibian, fish, bird (including all fowl and poultry) or other member commonly accepted as part of the animal kingdom. Animals shall be classified as follows:

- (1) **CAT.** Shall be intended to mean both the male and female of the Felidae species commonly cepted as domesticated household pets.
- (2) **DOG.** Shall be intended to mean both the male and female of the canine species, commonly accepted as domesticated household pets, and other domesticated animals of a dog kind. Any non-domestic animal must meet state guidelines and the owner must receive approval from the City.

- (3) **DOMESTIC ANIMALS.** Those animals commonly accepted as domesticated household pets. Unless otherwise defined, such animals shall include dogs, cats, caged birds, gerbils, hamsters, guinea pigs, ferrets (if vaccinated against rabies), domesticated rabbits, domesticated rats, fish and non-venomous reptiles or amphibians and other similar animals.
- (4) **WILD** or **EXOTIC NON-DOMESTICATED ANIMALS.** Those animals commonly considered to be naturally wild and not naturally trained or domesticated, or which are commonly considered to be inherently dangerous to the health, safety, and welfare of people. Unless otherwise defined, such animals shall include:
- (a) Any member of the large cat family (family Felidae) including lions, tigers, cougars, bobcats, leopards and jaguars, but excluding commonly accepted domesticated house cats.
- (b) Any naturally wild member of the canine family (family Canidae) including wolves, foxes, coyotes, dingoes, and jackals, but excluding commonly accepted domesticated dogs.
- (c) Any crossbreeds such as the crossbreed between a wolf and a dog, unless the crossbreed is commonly accepted as a domesticated house pet.
- (d) Any member or relative of the rodent family including any skunk (whether or not descented), raccoon, squirrel, or ferret (unless vaccinated against rabies), but excluding those members otherwise defined as domesticated pets.
- (e) Any venomous, or inherently dangerous member of the reptile or amphibian families as well as crocodiles and alligators.
- (f) Any other animal which is not explicitly listed above but which can be reasonably defined by the terms of this section, including but not limited to bears, deer, monkeys and game fish.
- (3) **FARM ANIMALS.** Those animals commonly associated with a farm or performing work in ar agricultural setting. Unless otherwise defined, such animals shall include members of the equestrian family (horses, mules), bovine family (cows, bulls), sheep, poultry (chickens, roosters, turkeys), fowl (ducks, geese), swine (including Vietnamese pot-bellied pigs), goats, bees, and other animals associated with a farm, ranch, or stable.
- **AT LARGE.** Shall be intended to mean off the premises of the owner and not under the custody and control of the owner or other person, either by restraint, cord, or chain.

ENFORCEMENT OFFICER or **OFFICER**. The Animal Control Officer, members of the Emily Police Department, and/or the city appointed authority for the city who shall enforce the provisions of this section. The duties of the Enforcement Officer are as follows:

- (1) Capture, seize and deliver to any designated pound any animal running at large within the city.
- (2) Investigate all reported incidents wherein a dog has bitten a person and confirm that said animal is quarantined as required herein.
 - (3) Such other matters as may be prescribed by the City Council, Police Chief or designee.

OWNER. Shall be intended to mean any person or persons, firm, association or corporation owning, keeping, or harboring an animal.

RESTRAINT.

- (1) Physical confinement such as; by leash, chain, cable, fence, electronic control, or building;
- (2) Under competent voice control of a person who is physically present with an animal when that animal is on the property of the owner; or

(3) Under competent voice control when an animal is engaged in a recognized animal activity or form of training requiring that it not be physically confined.

§ 92.02 DOGS AND CATS.

- (A) Running at large prohibited. It shall be unlawful for any person, or the parents or the guardians of any such person under 18 years of age, who owns, harbors, or keeps a dog or cat, to allow the dog or cat to run at large. Dogs or cats must be restrained by a responsible person and shall be permitted on streets, sidewalks, trails or on other public land unless the city has posted an area with signs reading "Dogs or Cats Prohibited."
- (B) Animals per residence. It shall be unlawful for any owner residing on less than two acres to possess or maintain more than three animals, dogs/cats or any combination thereof, over the age of 90 days at his, her or their residence or any single unit of occupancy within city limits.

(C) License required.

- (1) All dogs/cats over the age of four months kept, harbored, or maintained by their owners in the city, shall be licensed and registered with the city. Animal licenses shall be issued by the city upon payment of the annual license fee. The annual license fee shall be set in the Fee Schedule Ordinance on file in the city offices. The owner shall state, at the time application is made for the license and upon forms provided for such purpose, his or her name and address and the name, breed, color, and sex of each dog/cat owned or kept by him or her. No license shall be granted for a dog/cat which has not been vaccinated against rabies, as provided in this section. Vaccination shall be performed only by a doctor qualified to practice veterinary medicine in the state in which the dog/cat is vaccinated. A veterinarian who vaccinates a dog/cat to be licensed in the city shall complete a certificate of vaccination. One copy shall be issued to the dog/cat owner for affixing to the license application. An applicant for a license for a neutered dog/cat shall sign an affidavit indicating that the dog/cat has an neutered and shall give the date of the operation.
- (2) It shall be the duty of each owner of a dog/cat subject to this section to pay to the city the license fee as set forth in the Fee Schedule Ordinance on file in the city offices.
- (3) Upon payment of the license fee, the city shall issue to the owner a license certificate and metallic tag for each dog/cat licensed. The tag shall have stamped the number corresponding with the number on the certificate. Every owner shall be required to provide each dog/cat with a collar to which the license tag must be affixed, and shall see that the collar and tag are constantly worn. In case an animal tag is lost or destroyed, a duplicate shall be issued by the city upon the presentation of a receipt showing the payment of the license fee, as set forth in the Fee Schedule Ordinance on file in the city offices, for the then current license year and after payment by the applicant of the fee as set forth in the Fee Schedule Ordinance for issuance of the duplicate license. Animal tags shall not be transferable from one dog/cat to another and no refunds shall be made on any animal license fee or tag because of death of a dog/cat or the owner's leaving the city before the expiration of the license period. It is unlawful to counterfeit or attempt to counterfeit tags provided for herein, or to take from any dog/cat a tag legally placed upon it by its owner with the intention of placing it upon another dog/cat.
- (4) The licensing provisions of this division shall not apply to dogs/cats whose owners are non-residents temporarily within the city (not more than 30 days), nor to dogs/cats brought into the city for the purpose of participating in any dog/cat show. Further, this provision shall not apply to "seeing eye" dogs properly trained for the purpose of providing service to persons with disabilities to aid them in raing from place to place provided that a certification of assistance training from a recognized school program is submitted with the license application.
- (5) The funds received by the city from all animal licenses and metallic tags shall first be used to defray any costs incidental to the enforcement of this section; including, but not restricted to, the costs of licenses, metallic tags, and impounding and maintenance of the dogs/cats.

- (6) Any dogs/cats brought into the city must be properly licensed within 30 days of having been moved into the city.
- (D) Cats. Cats shall be included as controlled by this section insofar as licensing, running-at-large, pickup, impounding, boarding and proof of vaccine is concerned. All other provisions of this section, shall also apply to cats unless otherwise provided.
 - (E) Vaccination.
- (1) All dogs and cats kept harbored, maintained, or transported within the city shall be properly immunized by a licensed veterinarian for:

Rabies A properly administered vaccine by a licensed veterinarian with a documented expiration date

- (2) A certificate of vaccination must be kept, on which is stated the date of vaccination, owner's name and address, the animal's name (if applicable), sex, description and weight, the type of vaccine, and the veterinarian's signature. Upon demand made by the Enforcement Officer, the owner shall present for examination the required certificate(s) of vaccination for the animal(s). In cases where certificates are not presented, the owner or keeper of the animal(s) shall have seven days in which to present the certificate(s) to the city. Failure to do so shall be deemed a violation of this section.
- (3) Any animal covered by this subdivision found off the owner's premises and not wearing a valid rabies vaccination tag shall be impounded. Any unvaccinated animal that is so impounded may be reclaimed by its owner by payment of the prescribed pound fees and compliance with the rabies vaccination requirement of this section, proof of which shall be furnished to the city within 72 hours of its release from the pound.

Penalty, see § 92.99

Editor's note:

For any fees or costs associated with a licenses, see the ordinance adopting a schedule of fines and fees on file in the city offices.

§ 92.03 WILD OR EXOTIC NON-DOMESTICATED ANIMALS.

It shall be legal for any person to own, possess, or harbor any wild or exotic non-domesticated animal with proper permits within the city limits, but illegal to offer for sale. Any owner of such an animal at the time of adoption of this section shall have 30 days in which to remove the animal from the city after which time the city may impound the animal as provided for in this section. An exception shall be made to this prohibition for animals specifically trained for and actually providing assistance to the handicapped or disabled, and for those animals brought into the city as part of an operating zoo, veterinarian clinic, scientific research laboratory, education or training event, or a licensed show or exhibition, and meet state guidelines, including the owner must receive approval from the city.

§ 92.04 FARM ANIMALS.

Farm animals shall only be kept in zoning districts if permitted under the city zoning ordinance. An exception shall be made to this Section for those animals brought into the city as part of an operating zoo, veterinarian clinic, scientific research laboratory, or a licensed show or exhibition.

Penalty, see § 92.99

§ 92.05 ABANDONMENT.

No person shall abandon any dog/cat or other animal within the boundaries of the city.

Penalty, see § 92.99

§ 92.06 IMPOUNDING.

(A) Running at large. Any animal running at large is hereby declared a public nuisance. The Enforcement Officer may impound any dog or other animal found running at large and shall give notice of the impounding within 24 hours to the owner of such dog or other animal, if known. Except as otherwise provided in this section, it shall be unlawful to kill, destroy, or otherwise cause injury to any animal, including dogs and cats running at large, with the exception of animals being hunted during a lawful hunting season.

(B) Biting animals.

- (1) Person bitten by animal. Any animal that has not been inoculated by a current rabies vaccine administered by a licensed veterinarian and which has bitten any person, wherein the skin has been punctured or the services of a doctor are required, may be confined in an appropriate location for a period of not less than ten days, at the expense of the owner. The animal may be released at the end of such time if healthy and free from symptoms of rabies, and by the payment of all costs by the owner. However, if the owner of the animal shall elect immediately upon receipt of notice of need for such confinement by the Officer to voluntarily and immediately confine the animal for the required period of time in a veterinary hospital of the owner's choosing, not outside of the county in which this city is located, and provide immediate proof of such confinement in such manner as may be required, the owner may do so. If, however, the owner has proof of the vaccination by a certificate from a licensed veterinarian, the owner may confine the dog or other animal to the owner's property.
 - (2) Animal bitten by rabid animal.
- (a) Unvaccinated animals. In the case of animals which have not been vaccinated in accordance with this section which have been bitten by a known rabid animal, said animal shall be euthanized upon the written consent of the owner. If the owner is unwilling to have the bitten animal euthanized, strict isolation of the animal in a kennel under veterinarian supervision shall be required. The owner of the animal shall bear the expense of same.
- (b) Vaccinated animals. If the bitten animal is vaccinated in accordance with the provisions of this section, the animal shall be held as follows:
- 1. The animal shall immediately be revaccinated and confined at the owner's home for a period of 30 days following revaccination; or
- 2. If the animal is not immediately revaccinated, the animal shall be confined in strict isolation in a kennel for six months under the supervision of a veterinarian.
- 3. *Euthanasia*. In either situation noted in this subdivision, if the veterinarian determines that the bitten animal is rabid, said animal shall be euthanized.
- (C) Reclaiming. All animals conveyed to the impoundment location shall be kept, with humane treatment and sufficient food and water for their comfort, at least seven days after the animal is taken into custody, unless reclaimed sooner by their owners or keepers as provided by this section. In case the owner or keeper shall desire to reclaim the animal from the pound, the following shall be required:
 - (1) If a dog is unlicensed, payment of a regular license fee and valid certificate of vaccination for pies is required.
- (2) Payment of all fees accumulated including, but not limited to, expenses incurred by the animal shelter, including impound fees, boarding of dog/cat, any necessary veterinary treatment, and rabies vaccination if said dog/cat is not current.

(D) Unclaimed animals. At the expiration of the times established in division (C), if the animal has not been reclaimed in accordance with the provisions of this section, the Officer appointed to enforce this section may let any person claim the animal by complying with all provisions in this section, or cause the animal to be destroyed in accordance with the provisions of this section.

§ 92.07 COMMERCIAL KENNELS, HOBBY KENNELS, AND/OR BOARDING FACILITIES.

- (A) Compliance with Minnesota Statutes. All commercial kennels, hobby kennels, and/or boarding facilities shall be operated in accordance with Minnesota Statutes.
- (B) Animal boarding facility. An establishment that houses animals, other than those belonging to the occupant, overnight or over an extended period of time.
- (C) Definition of **KENNEL**. The keeping of three or more dogs on the same premises, whether owned by the same person or not and for whatever purpose kept, shall constitute a **KENNEL**; except that a fresh litter of pups may be kept for a period of three months before that keeping shall be deemed to be a **KENNEL**.
- (D) Kennel as a nuisance. Because the keeping of three or more dogs on the same premises is subject to great abuse, causing discomfort to persons in the area by way of smell, noise, hazard, and general aesthetic depreciation, the keeping of three or more dogs on the premises is hereby declared to be a nuisance and no person shall keep or maintain a kennel within the city.

§ 92.08 NOTICES.

The City Clerk/Treasurer shall cause a notice to be published in the official newspaper of the city one time prior to June 1 each year.

§ 92.09 NUISANCES.

- (A) Habitual barking/noise. It shall be unlawful for any person to keep or harbor a dog that habitually barks, yelps, howls, cries or whimpers so as to unreasonably disturb the peace and quiet of any person in the vicinity. The phrase "unreasonably disturb the peace and quiet" shall include but is not limited to the creation of any noise by a dog that can be heard by any person, including the Enforcement Officer for repeated intervals of at least three minutes with less than one minute of interruption. Such noise must also be audible off of the owner's or caretaker's premises.
- (B) Damage to property. It shall be unlawful for any person's dog or other animal to damage any lawn, garden, or other property, whether or not the owner has knowledge of the damage. Any animal covered by this division may be impounded as provided in this section or a complaint may be issued by anyone aggrieved by an animal under this subdivision, against the owner of the animal for prosecution under this section.
- (C) Cleaning up litter/feces. The owner of any animal or person having the custody or control of any animal shall be responsible for cleaning up any feces of the animal and disposing of such feces in a sanitary manner whether on their own property, on the property of others or on public property. The clean-up of feces on the animal owner's property shall not exceed 72 hours from May 1 through October 31 and once per week from November 1 through April 30. The clean-up of feces on the property of others or public property shall be immediate. Any person violating this section shall be punished with a fine as set forth in the Fee Schedule Ordinance on file in the city offices.
- (D) Other. Any animals kept contrary to this section are subject to impoundment as provided in this section.

Penalty, see § 92.99

§ 92.10 TRESPASSES.

- (A) It is unlawful for any person to herd, drive, or ride any farm animal or domesticated animal over and upon any grass, turf, boulevard, city park, cemetery, garden, or lot without specific permission from the owner of the property.
- (B) It is unlawful for any person to permit any farm animal or domesticated animal to go upon any ass, turf, boulevard, cemetery, garden, or lot without the specific permission to do so from the owner of the property.

Penalty, see § 92.99

§ 92.11 SEIZURE OF ANIMALS.

Any Enforcement Officer may enter upon private property and seize any animal provided that the following exists:

- (A) There is an identified complainant other than the Enforcement Officer making a contemporaneous complaint about the animal;
- (B) The Officer reasonably believes that the animal meets the criteria for cruelty set out in § 92.16; or the criteria for an at large animal set out in § 92.02(A);
- (C) The Officer can demonstrate that there has been inhumane treatment of the animal; or that the animal was at large at this address on a prior date;
- (D) The Officer has made a reasonable attempt to contact the owner of the property and those attempts have either failed or have been ignored;
- (E) The seizure will not involve the forced entry into a private residence. Use of a pass key obtained from a property manager, landlord, innkeeper, or other authorized person to have such key all not be considered unauthorized entry; and
- (F) Written notice of the seizure is left in a conspicuous place if personal contact with the owner of the dog is not possible.

§ 92.12 ANIMALS PRESENTING A DANGER TO HEALTH AND SAFETY OF CITY.

If, in the reasonable belief of any person or Enforcement Officer, an animal presents an immediate danger to the health and safety of any person, or the animal is threatening imminent harm to any person, or the animal is in the process of attacking any person, the Officer may destroy the animal in a proper and humane manner. Otherwise the person or Officer may apprehend the animal and deliver it to the pound for confinement under § 92.06. If the animal is destroyed, a charge as set forth in the Fee Schedule Ordinance on file in the city offices, to dispose of the animal is payable by the owner of the animal. If the animal is found not to be a danger to the health and safety of the city, it may be released to the owner or keeper in accordance with § 92.06(C).

§ 92.13 DISEASED ANIMALS.

- (A) Running at large. No person shall keep or allow to be kept on his or her premises, or on premises occupied by them, nor permit to run at large in the city, any animal which is diseased so as to be a danger to the health and safety of the city, even though the animal be properly licensed under this section.
- (B) Confinement. Any animal reasonably suspected of being diseased and presenting a threat to health and safety of the public, may be apprehended and confined in the pound by the owner or inforcement Officer. The Officer shall have a qualified veterinarian examine the animal. If the animal is found to be diseased in such a manner so as to be a danger to the health and safety of the city, the Officer shall cause such animal to be painlessly killed and shall properly dispose of the remains. The

owner or keeper of the animal killed under this section shall be liable for all costs of maintaining and disposing of the animal, plus the costs of any veterinarian examinations.

(C) Release. If the animal, upon examination, is not found to be diseased within the meaning of this section, the animal shall be released to the owner or keeper free of charge.

§ 92.14 REGULATION OF DANGEROUS DOGS.

- (A) Definition of **DANGEROUS DOG**. The definition of a **DANGEROUS DOG** shall be taken from M.S. §§ 347.50 to 347.56, as those statutes may be amended from time to time, which are hereby adopted and incorporated by reference into the City Code. The Enforcement Officer, or designee, shall have the authority to order the euthanasia of a dangerous dog meeting the criteria established in state statute, subject to the procedure set forth herein.
- (B) *Proper enclosure*. Proper enclosure means securely confined indoors or in a securely locked outdoor pen or structure suitable to prevent the dog from escaping and to provide protection for the animal from the elements. A proper enclosure does not include a porch, patio, or any part of a house, garage, or other structure that would allow the animal to exit of its own volition, or any house or structure in which windows are open or in which door or window screens are the only barriers which prevent the animal from exiting.
- (C) *Unprovoked*. Unprovoked shall mean the condition in which the animal is not purposely excited, stimulated, agitated, or disturbed.
- (D) *Procedure/hearing*. The procedure to seize an animal that appears to be dangerous shall be as follows:
- (1) Notify the owner, by registered mail that the animal appears to be dangerous. The notice shall specify the dates, times, places and parties or animals bitten. Said notice shall also apprise the owner of the animal that he or she may request a hearing before the City Council by notifying the City Clerk/Treasurer within ten days after the receipt of the notice.
- (2) If the owner does not request a hearing within 14 days of said notice, the Enforcement Officer shall immediately take possession of the animal and euthanize the same.
- (3) If the owner of the animal requests a hearing as to the dangerous nature of the animal, the City Clerk/Treasurer shall place the matter before the City Council at its next regular meeting. The owner may present evidence in opposition to the designation of the animal as dangerous. The Enforcement Officer shall present evidence to the City Council that supports the determination that the animal is dangerous. Following the hearing, the Council shall make a determination of the facts and issue an order as to whether or not said animal is properly characterized as dangerous. If the Council determines that the animal is dangerous, it will then order the owner to deliver said animal to the Enforcement Officer for the purpose of euthanizing said animal, unless the owner provides an alternative proposal, acceptable to the City Council which may include the permanent removal of the animal from the city limits.

Editor's note:

For any fees or costs associated with a licenses, see the ordinance adopting a schedule of fines and fees on file in the city offices.

§ 92.15 DANGEROUS ANIMAL REQUIREMENTS.

- (A) Requirements. If the City Council does not order the destruction of an animal that has been declared dangerous, the City Council may, as an alternative, order any or all of the following:
- (1) That the owner provides and maintain a proper enclosure for the dangerous animal as specified in § 92.13(B);

- (2) Post the front and the rear of the premises with clearly visible warning signs, including a warning symbol to inform children, that there is a dangerous animal on the property as specified in M.S. §§ 347.50 to 347.56, as it may be amended from time to time:
- (3) Provide and show proof annually of public liability insurance in the minimum amount of 00,000;
- (4) If the animal is a dog and is outside the proper enclosure, the dog must be muzzled and restrained by a substantial chain or restraint (not to exceed six feet in length) and under the physical restraint of a person 18 years of age or older. The muzzle must be of such design as to prevent the dog from biting any person or animal, but will not cause injury to the dog or interfere with its vision or respiration; and
- (5) The owner must annually license dangerous and potentially dangerous dogs with the city and must license a newly declared dangerous or potentially dangerous dog within 14 days after notice that a dog has been declared dangerous or potentially dangerous. Regardless of any appeal that may be requested, the owner must comply with the requirements of M.S. § 347.52(a) and (c), as it may be amended from time to time regarding proper enclosures and notification to the city upon transfer or death of the dog, until and unless a hearing officer or court of law reverses the declaration.
- (6) Any or all additional requirements permitted under M.S. § 347.50 to 347.56, as it may be amended from time to time.
- (B) Seizure. The Enforcement Officer shall immediately seize any dangerous animal if the owner does not meet any of the above requirements imposed by the City Council within 14 days after the date notice is sent to the owner that the animal is dangerous.
- (C) Reclaiming dangerous animals. A dangerous animal seized under division (B), above, may be claimed by the owner of the animal upon payment of impounding and boarding fees, and presenting of to Enforcement Officer that each of the requirements under division (A), above, is fulfilled. An animal not reclaimed under this section within 14 days may be disposed of as provided under § 92.06 and the owner is liable to the city for all costs incurred in confining the animal and having the animal destroyed including, but not limited to, reimbursement of all of the city's legal fees and court costs.
- (D) Subsequent offenses. If an owner of an animal has subsequently violated the provisions under § 92.14 with the same animal, the animal must be seized by the Enforcement Officer. The owner may request a hearing as provided for in § 92.14. If the owner is found to have violated the provisions for which the animal was seized, the Enforcement Officer shall order the animal destroyed in a proper and humane manner and the owner shall pay the costs of confining, impounding and destroying the animal. If the person is found not to have violated the provisions for which the animal was seized, the owner may reclaim the animal under the provisions of § 92.15(C). If the animal is not yet reclaimed by the owner within 14 days after the date the owner is notified that the animal may be reclaimed, the animal may be disposed of as provided under § 92.06 and the owner is liable to the animal control for the costs incurred in confining, impounding and destroying of the animal.

Penalty, see § 92.99

§ 92.16 BASIC CARE.

All animals shall receive from their owners or keepers kind treatment, housing in the winter, and sufficient food and water for their comfort. Any person not treating their pet in such a humane manner will be subject to the penalties provided in this section.

2.17 INTERFERENCE WITH OFFICERS.

No person shall in any manner molest, hinder, or interfere with any person authorized by the Council to capture dogs, cats or other animals and convey them to the pound while engaged in such

operation. Nor shall any unauthorized person break open the pound, or attempt to do so, or take or attempt to take from any agent any animal taken up by him or her in compliance with this section, or in any other manner to interfere with or hinder such officer in the discharge of his or her duties under this section.

Penalty, see § 92.99

§ 92.18 UNLAWFUL ACTS.

It is unlawful for the owner of any domestic animal to violate the provisions of this section or (1) to own or keep a domestic animal which is dangerous (any animal which has caused injury to persons or property shall be deemed "dangerous"); or (2) to interfere with the Animal Enforcement Officer, any Police Officer, or other city employee, in the performance of their duty to enforce this section; or (3) to allow their domestic animal to frequent school grounds, parks, or public beaches or to chase vehicles, or to molest or annoy any person away from the property of its owner or custodian, or to damage, defile or destroy public or private property.

Penalty, see § 92.99

§ 92.99 PENALTIES.

Unless otherwise provided herein, violation of this section shall constitute a misdemeanor. Violations of §§ 92.02, 92.08 and 92.16 are petty misdemeanors punishable by a fine of up to \$200.

POLICE DEPARTMENT

§ 33.65 POLICE DEPARTMENT CONTINUED.

- (A) A Police Department is hereby continued. The City Council may at any time determine by resolution to discontinue the existence of a Police Department and provide for the enforcement of state laws and city ordinances by other means. The head of the Police Department shall be known as the Chief of Police and the number of additional members of the Police Department, together with their ranks and titles, shall be determined by the City Council by resolution. The compensation to be paid to members of the Police Department shall be as set forth in the Fee Schedule Ordinance as amended from time to time. Members of the Police Department shall be appointed by the City Council. Work schedules of members of the Police Department shall be established by the Chief of Police with the approval of the Council.
- (B) All police officers shall meet the minimum standards for licensing as a peace officer as established by the Minnesota Peace Officers Standards and Training Board and have a current and valid peace officer license at the time of appointment. All police officers shall retain this license during their employment as a police officer with the city and will be subject to discharge if the license is suspended, revoked or becomes invalid for any reason. In addition, all police officers must have a valid Minnesota vehicle operator's license and must be insurable as a vehicle driver by the city's automobile insurance carrier.

(Ord., passed - -)

§ 33.66 CHIEF OF POLICE.

The Chief of Police shall have supervision and control of the Police Department and its members. The Chief of Police shall be responsible to the Council for law enforcement and for property of the city used by the Department. The Chief of Police shall be responsible for the proper training and discipline of the members of the Police Department. The Chief of Police shall be responsible for the keeping of adequate records and shall report to the City Council on the needs of the Police Department and its work. Every member of the Police Department is subordinate to the Chief of Police and shall obey the instructions of the Chief of Police and any superior officer. The City Council may designate one of the police officers as Acting Chief, who shall have all the powers and duties of the Chief of Police during the absence or disability of the Chief of Police. The compensation to be paid to the Chief of Police shall be as set forth in the Police Chief Employment Agreement as amended from time to time.

(Ord., passed - -)

§ 33.67 DUTIES OF POLICE.

Members of the Police Department are authorized to enforce the laws applicable to the city, bring violators before the court, and make complaints for offenses coming to their knowledge. Members of the Police Department are authorized to serve processes on behalf of the city and shall serve those notices as may be required by the City Council or other authority. When the city is not a party to the proceedings involved in the process or notice, the officer shall collect the same fees as provided by law. All fees shall be paid into the city treasury.

(Ord., passed - -)

§ 33.68 UNIFORM AND BADGE.

Each member of the Police Department shall, while on duty, wear a suitable badge and uniform furnished by the city, except that the Chief of Police may authorize the performance of specific duties while not in uniform. When a member terminates membership in the Police Department, the member shall immediately deliver to the city the badge, uniform and all other property of the city.

§ 33.69 RESERVE OFFICERS.

- (A) The Chief of Police may appoint, for a specified time, as many reserve officers as may be necessary. Reserve officers shall be subordinate to the Chief of Police. Under the provisions of M.S. 626.84, Subd. 1(e), as it may be amended from time to time, a *RESERVE OFFICER* is an individual whose services are utilized by a law enforcement agency to provide supplementary assistance at special events, traffic or crowd control, and administrative or clerical assistance. A reserve officer's duties shall not include enforcement of the general criminal laws of the state, and the reserve officer does not have full powers of arrest or authorization to carry a firearm on duty.
- (B) The Chief of Police, or City Council if there is no Police Chief, may appoint, for a specified time, as many parking enforcement officers pursuant to M.S. § 168B.035 Subd. 2, as it may be amended from time to time, as may be necessary. The parking enforcement officers shall be subordinate to the Chief of Police, if there is one, or the City Clerk. A *PARKING ENFORCEMENT OFFICER* is an individual whose services are utilized by a law enforcement agency to provide parking enforcement and administrative or clerical assistance. A parking enforcement officer's duties shall not include enforcement of the general criminal laws of the state, and the parking enforcement officer does not have full powers of arrest or authorization to carry a firearm on duty.

(Ord., passed - -)

§ 33.70 SPECIAL POLICE.

In case of riot or other law enforcement emergency, the Chief of Police may appoint for a specified time as many special police officers as may be necessary for the maintenance of law and order. During that term of appointment, the special police shall have only those powers and perform only those duties as shall be specifically assigned by the Chief of Police. Special police officers shall have only the authority to provide supplementary assistance at special events, traffic or crowd control, and administrative or clerical assistance. A special officer's duties do not include enforcement of the general criminal law of the state, and the officer does not have full powers of arrest.

(Ord., passed -)

§ 33.99 PENALTY.

- (A) Any person violating any provision of this chapter for which no specific penalty is prescribed shall be subject to § 10.99 of this code of ordinances.
- (B) Any person who violates any provision of §§ 33.01 through 33.08 of this chapter or any regulation adopted thereunder relating to acts, omissions or conduct other than official acts of city employees or officers is guilty of a misdemeanor.
- (C) Any person convicted of violating § 33.31 of this chapter shall be guilty of a misdemeanor. The fine shall be defined in M.S. § 609.033, as it may be amended from time to time, and laws amendatory thereto.
- (D) Any person convicted of violating any provision of § 33.53 of this chapter shall be guilty of a misdemeanor.

RE: Emily Manganese Project Update - August 2024

In August, the focus of the Company was to complete the metallurgical testing and analysis of drilled samples, being evaluated at the Kemetco Research Inc. laboratory, located in Richmond, British Columbia. The final flow sheet is still in optimization. The current Kemetco work is expected to be completed by this September.

Environmental visits associated with site reclamation (regrowth in disturbed areas) have continued and as of August over 80% of the plant growth and revegetation is complete. In association with the recent heavy rainfall, a limited number of the reclaimed areas show minor erosional disturbance requiring some repair (recontouring in areas of 'gully washes'). The visits and the corresponding reclamation activities are in the planned activities by the Company and conducted by Barr Engineering and Moritz Excavation, as approved by the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources.

North Star is continuing its discussions with the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources on its mineral lease applications on certain State mineral lands in the Emily area. This activity will be on-going in 2024.

North Star is committed to work with the City of Emily and the Emily City Council on the Emily Manganese Project and North Star will keep the Emily City Council appraised of developments of the Project.

The firefighter could tow the trailer with his or her personal vehicle.

The firefighter's own liability insurance would be primary. If the firefighter did not have sufficient liability limits, the city's auto liability would be excess coverage.

The city has the option to make LMCIT's auto liability coverage primary for privately owned vehicles used on city business by specified individuals or groups.

This seems like a case where the city might want to endorse the city's auto liability coverage to make the city's coverage primary for this particular firefighter.

The premium to add this to the city's auto policy is about \$12 per person. Note that is coverage is ONLY for Liability and there is NO Physical Damage coverage to the firefighters policy. Subject: Special Assessments due on Tax Forfeited Properties

To Whom it May Concern:

The State of Minnesota passed new legislature in 2024 that affects the sale and management of tax forfeited properties in Crow Wing County. We will no longer be remitting any outstanding balances on special assessments that have been levied against properties forfeited in the years 2016 – 2023 at the time of sale. Proceeds from sale of properties that forfeited in the years 2016-2023 will be sent to the state under the new legislation.

Additionally, properties that forfeit in 2024 and future years will have all taxes and special assessments cancelled at the time of forfeiture. If your taxing district wishes to collect special assessments due on properties forfeited in 2024 or future years, your tax district must recertify within 90 days of forfeiture. 



Programs for Local Government

Who is Sourcewell?

Sourcewell is a Minnesota Service Cooperative governed by Minnesota Statute 123A.21. Legislation passed in 1976 established nine educational cooperative service units across the state. Sourcewell is self-funded and has no taxing, levying, or borrowing authority.

Sourcewell at a glance

Today, Sourcewell partners with government, nonprofit, and education entities to boost student and community success, as well as provide funding, training, and shared services to help other public agencies do more with less.

All applications, except Impact Funds, are accepted on a rolling basis from July 15 – June 15.

Final reports from the previous fiscal year must be submitted before new awards will be granted.

Boost Funds

- Purpose: To allow member entities to address small projects with no match required.
- Applicant may request up to \$2,000 per fiscal year.
- Application must be submitted and agreement finalized before the project begins.

Match Funds

- Purpose: To allow member entities to plan for a project, or a collection of projects, that enhance operations and programs.
- Applicant may request up to \$50,000 per fiscal year
 a 25% match of the Sourcewell amount is required.
- Application must be submitted and agreement finalized before the project begins.
- County applications require a resolution from their governing board.

Impact Funds

- Impact Funds for FY 24-25 have already been awarded.
- Information on FY 25-26 Impact Funds will be available in early 2025.

Third-Party Services Reimbursement

- Purpose: To allow member entities to access professional expertise outside their entity to enhance their operations and programs.
- Sourcewell reimburses 100% of costs up to \$20,000 per fiscal year—can be done with multiple requests.
- Application for each service must be submitted and approved before you begin working with a thirdparty.
- A third-party is defined as an entity that would need to be contracted with because the applicant cannot provide the service in-house.

Internship Reimbursement

- Purpose: To allow member entities to provide internships that offer real-world experiences, bolster recruitment efforts, and strengthen community workforce sustainability.
- Application for each internship must be submitted and approved before the hiring process begins.
- Sourcewell reimburses \$15/hour for 640 hours.
- One intern per discipline per semester.

Regional Safety Groups – provided in partnership with the League of Minnesota Cities Insurance Trust.

- Sourcewell covers approximately 45% of costs for regional cities. LMC covers the remainder.

A William Bradford Memorial for your town

Before they stepped off the Mayflower, in November 1620, the male passengers, led by William Bradford, signed a Compact guaranteeing to each other that they would make, abide by, and enforce their own laws, thereby, creating America's 'First Constitution'. America 'the land of the free and the brave' was born that day. On November 11, 2024 America will celebrate the 404th anniversary of the signing of the Mayflower Compact.

The basis for this Memorial is taken from his Journal - *Bradford's History of Plimoth Plantation*. William Bradford was the first and longest serving governor chosen by the citizens of Plymouth Colony.

Bradford said, these pioneering citizens of Plymouth "were by the blessing of God the first beginners and in a sort the foundation of all the Plantations and Colonies in New England (and their families)."

Why is the Compact important? There are a number of prominent historians, men like John Quincy Adams, who believe the Compact, as man's first attempt at self-government, should be ranked with the Magna Carta and, perhaps, considered America's 'First Constitution.' He said "The Mayflower Compact is, perhaps, the only instance in human history of that original social compact, which philosophers have imagined as the only legitimate source of government."

Liberty Tree Society (LTS), a non-profit organization, is offering a 20-30 ft. tall American Liberty Elm, a 10" x 6" cast bronze memorial plaque commemorating the signing of the Mayflower Compact, and it's signers and a "Signing of the Mayflower Compact" framed print for display in the Town Hall. The Memorial honors William Bradford for his leadership role as author of the Mayflower Compact, as Father of our country and recognizes the Birth of Freedom in America which took place on the Mayflower.

The Memorial will serve as a model and the town will hold a public dedication and invite Mayflower descendants and freedom loving people to attend.

The Liberty Tree Society wishes to establish a William Bradford Memorial that will become a landmark where citizens can gather, and children can learn about the Birth of Freedom In America.
